

The Chicago Hebrew Mission (CHM) and their publication, *The Jewish Era*

I haven't been able to confirm whether Rev. J. I. Fles was acquainted with William Blackstone or just aware of him in the earliest years when the CHM began in the late 1880s. The Blackstone archive in Wheaton, IL said that they couldn't find Fles at all in their records. However considering that Fles must have had to go through Chicago's railroad station then, it seems likely to me that they had already met. Fles probably sought for like-minded, important individuals. Or even vice versa; since Fles already advocated / believed in spreading the Gospel to Jews in his [Three Bible Lessons](#), written in 1879.

The CHM began publishing *The Jewish Era* in January, 1892. Their inclination towards premillennialism and Zionism was immediately evident; see the following images from it. From my paper; "The Synod of 1892 document said (Fles's) Classis Muskegon initiated a request 'to support the above mentioned Mission.'" Fles and the CRC began their Mission to the Jews in support of several other missions in various cities that same year.

Fles published an article about the restoration of Israel in the popular *The Volksvriend* Iowan newspaper on July 8, 1886, right after that CRC Synod session. "Israel's Present and Future" was on Jeremiah 30:17 and said, "Israel will be so despised by the nations that it will not be looked after to help them out: no one cares for her."

Fles wrote another article in *The Volksvriend* on April 9, 1891. I doubt that this timing was a coincidence. Blackstone's letter to President Harrison was dated March 5, 1891. The *Volksvriend* printed an article about his Memorial on March 26 which favored Blackstone's "important petition ... born from a conference of Jews and Christians." (It had already been held in Chicago).

From the 1892 *Jewish Era*:

Hebrew Mission among the fifty thousand to sixty thousand Jews in Chicago, but hopes through friends of Israel to reach multitudes of Christians and awaken a scriptural interest in this work for God's ancient people, and thus under the blessing of God promote the mutual welfare of both Jew and Christian.

Information will be given of the remarkable unfolding of the divine plan for Israel as it is being revealed in the light of current events and the daily fulfillment of prophecy, and carefully prepared papers presented from time to time upon "The Covenants," "The Church and the Kingdom," and other subjects bearing upon the relation of Israel to the Gospel according to the Scriptures. And this paper will always be kept in tune to strike a chord of sympathy and relief in behalf of the sorrowing and persecuted, the sick and the helpless among the chosen seed.

He who "kept Israel—or compassed him about—as the apple of his eye," has also loved him with an everlasting love and has filled his word with covenant-promises which can no more be broken than the covenant with the sun and with the moon. Jer. 31: 35, 36; Isa. 54: 9, 10, and other Scriptures.

And the word remains as true to-day as when Balaam, against his wishes, testified of Israel "Blessed is he that blesseth thee." Under this benediction *THE JEWISH ERA* is presented as a Gospel messenger.

THEY SHALL PROSPER THAT LOVE THEE.

These words were spoken by the Psalmist of the city of Jerusalem, and the house of God in the midst of it; but they surely apply now to those who once dwelt in Jerusalem, and who, though scattered among the nations, are still "beloved for the fathers' sakes," as Paul urges in this very case that "the gifts and calling of God are without repentance." The prosperity of the Christian Church, its mission success, its growth in every virtue, its intelligent mastery of those social and rational problems involved in the bringing in of the Kingdom of God, are all vitally connected with the Jews. In a far-reaching sense it is as true now as in the time that Jesus spoke to the Samaritan, "Salvation is of the Jews." Such considerations led a few Christians in Chicago to plan the Hebrew Mission in the midst of the fifty or sixty thousand Israelites of this great


North Street Christian Reformed Church's (in Zeeland) first minister when they began in 1882-1883, Rev. Fles, and their second minister, Rev. Riemersma likely went to the 1893 Chicago World's Fair to witness about Jesus. Blackstone was a member of the World's Columbian Commission for the Chicago Fair, and met with President Grover Cleveland in that role. D. L. Moody held huge revival meetings nearby under a circus tent. In 1895, Riemersma became a trustee of the Chicago Hebrew Mission board.

Riemersma wrote a (valuable) biography of Fles in *The Jewish Era* in 1894. (This is mentioned in the main paper too, see that end note 2 for a link to it.)

"Begun in 1896 and initially written in Dutch under the title *De Heidenwereld*, the magazine has consistently promoted the missionary outreach of the Christian Reformed and Reformed Churches." Rev. Fles wrote a monthly column in it. My paper explains that this interesting source has not been digitized yet. It is at Heritage Hall, the RCA doesn't have it.

Now let me go to 1897 and Theodor Herzl. He has been called the 'Father of Zionism' (so was Blackstone).

MR. FREUDER reports a pleasant and successful quarter's work. Everywhere he was received with great kindness by Jews and Christians. Spoke July 10, at Baraboo, Wis.; July 17, Seward, Ill.; July 20, Rockford; July 29, Macatawa Park Assembly; July 31, **Holland**, Mich.; Aug. 7, Grand Rapids; Aug. 14, Hinsdale, Ill.; Aug. 21, La Grange; Aug. 24, Lake Bluff; Aug. 28, Joliet; Aug. 29, New Lennox; Sept. 4, and 5, Muskegon, Mich.; Sept. 11, Grand Rapids; Sept. 12, Grand Haven; Sept. 13, Spring Lake; Sept. 14, Milwaukee, Wis.; Sept. 25, La Grange.

I can't prove this list shows that a passionate insider like Fles chose which cities to visit. But page 122 of my paper notes other later examples of the same type of carefully selective fund-raising efforts.

PROPHECY AND FULFILLMENT.

FINANCES.

From what we have written, it will be seen how greatly God has prospered us financially. Our small beginning on 12th Street has increased, our properties today being valued at about \$60,000, with an indebtedness upon them of about \$10,000, of which we have already spoken and which we hope may entirely be removed this Quarter-Centennial year—"the good hand of our God being upon us for good." And we would be glad if a start were made in this direction today (Nov. 6th) and before this Quarter-Centennial year shall have closed we may be able to burn our mortgages and shout our hallelujahs.

It may be interesting to know something concerning the money that God has been pleased to put in our hands during the years past. We feel that we should add to the glory of God that the large amount of money that has been raised the past twenty-five years has come to us in answer to prayer. Our habit has been to "Ask the Lord and tell His people." The answers to prayer have been marvelous. Many, many times has it seemed impossible for us to meet our liabilities—even our daily needs—but our loving, heavenly Father has proved Himself to be "the God of the impossible" as we have waited upon Him, and He has sent us funds in unexpected, unsolicited ways. It would not glorify God if we did not mention the funds that have come to us through our faithful friends of the German Church of the DeWitt Memorial of New York City, of the Christian Reformed Church of America, and the Reformed Church of North America. Many times has the Doxology been sung over the timely offerings of these dear saints. From Maine to California, aye, even from *foreign lands*, have come rich gifts, a beautiful illustration of the time when the kings of the earth shall offer their gifts to the King of Israel, in order that they may worship God acceptably in their own land. We wish there were time to tell of some of these wonderful answers. Perhaps one in connection with this Reading Room would be in point.

AN ANSWER TO PRAYER.

After we purchased the Reading Room, it was necessary to put about \$400 worth of repairs, including lumber, upon the building. We only had about \$80 on hand. Understanding that the will of the Lord was to go ahead and He would supply the need, we went to one of our friends, a lumber dealer, and said to him, "Now, David, you can get lumber much cheaper than we. Will you see at what price you can get this for us?" handing him a memorandum the carpenter had given. He sat down at the telephone and called up a large firm and said, "I am interested in The Chicago Hebrew Mission. The Superintendent, Mrs. Rounds, is here and tells me they are making some repairs on a building they have just bought and I am going to do what I can, and I want you to give them 1,300

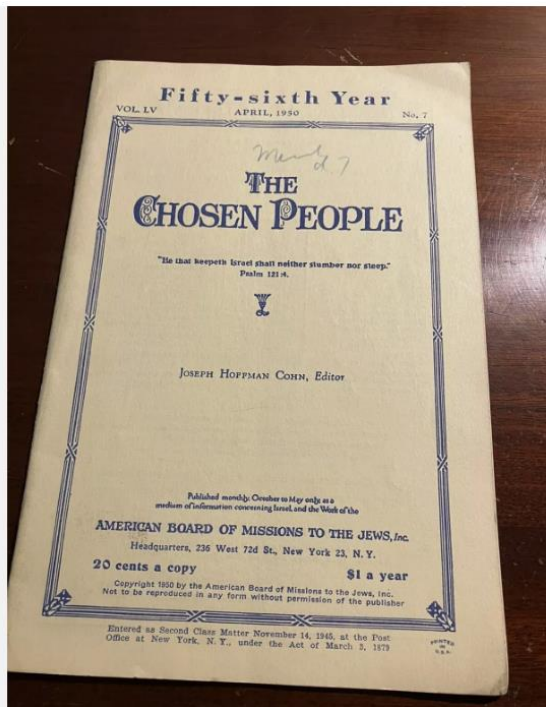
I'll pick one name out from the above to see what a search on him shows;" What is 'The Responsibility of the Church in Relation to Israel'? The Rev. B. B. Sutcliffe gave seven reasons for this responsibility..." He was associated with Moody Bible Institute and a Pres. of "Multnomah School of the Bible Interdenominational— Evangelistic" in Portland, Oregon. Simon Dekker was an assistant treasurer. Fles's premillennial eschatology had probably also influenced the RCA minister, Rev. C. Kuyper. This likely influence may have been via RCA seminary professor, Dr. Egbert Winter, who had probably known Fles when both were in Iowa. - Per my paper and its sources, see pages 80 – 81.

I was looking into Rev. B. B. Sutcliffe (mentioned here; <https://www.ministrymagazine.org/archive/1943/02/popular-interest-in-prophecy>.) It notes, "The very foundation for premillennial teaching is the Jewish restoration." Then I came across this – here are image snippets.

The American Board of Missions to the Jews was an independent evangelical Christian “faith mission” founded in 1894. Unsurprisingly, Dr. Mitch Glaser has more information available about them. 1950 was their 56th year.

Historical Information

American Board of Missions to Jews (Beth Sar Shalom) is a nondenominational, independent faith mission, evangelical in doctrine, founded in 1894, as a pioneer in Jewish missions. Its missionaries and ministers are ordained by different denominations. The primary aim of the ABMJ is witnessing to Jews, and discipling and involving them in local church programs after conversion.

The work was begun by a Jewish rabbi, Leopold Cohn, who came to the United States in 1892, settled in Brooklyn, New York, and was converted to Christianity. He was succeeded by his son, Joseph Hoffman Cohn, who expanded the work to include Canada, England, Europe, Israel, and South America. On the death of Cohn, the mission continued under the direction of a Board of Directors.

Ministries include centers, literature distribution, Bible conferences, television specials, radio programs, media presentations of the gospel, campus and youth ministries. A student training program gives guidance and financial support to promising young Jewish converts and Jewish Christians so that they may attend Bible schools and colleges for education as Jewish evangelists. The Jewish Training Institute offers a three-year course to those Christians who are interested in Jewish evangelism. These activities are spread throughout the United States and Canada as well as in Europe, Israel, and South America.

Its publications include: The Chosen People, official publication of the mission; The End Times, a bimonthly radio publication; Shepherd of Israel, a periodical directed to unconverted Jews; tracts, books, and a Jewish art calendar. A fifteen-minute radio program, "The Chosen People News Hour," is broadcast five days a week throughout the United States. Foreign language broadcasts are conducted in France and Israel. Area prophetic conferences are also held in the United States and Canada in cooperation with local evangelical churches. Summer conferences are also held at various campgrounds in the United States and Canada.

In 1982 ABMJ had a staff of 92 missionaries and 17 clerics.
